### What "is" working on the website:


- 1. Join page: You can renew your membership or join the Association

I am hopeful that very soon we can start working on the aesthetics of the overall website and get you a "fresh new look" and feel for the website.





### Message from the National EOD Association Chaplain

I remember fondly my years as an EOD Technician at Yuma Proving Grounds, AZ.

Working the ranges; doing what EOD Techs do best in a peacetime assignment. A Jeep, a trailer, and cases of C-4 with all day on a range. Perhaps you can identify?

But there was that time, three of us got a ¾ ton stuck. No commo to range control, not enough water, etc. So, we had to walk out. It was summer in the Arizona desert.

I share this embarrassing 'desert moment' because I believe all of us as EOD techs have a similar story. Peacetime or wartime, 'Murphey's law'....still rules.

His name was Joseph, and he was having a 'desert moment'. Eldest son of Rachel, daughter of Laben, and Joseph found himself stuck at the bottom of a dry well in the desert. # This month's featured Member of the "EOD Family"

EODC Melissa "Mo" Tackitt, USN
Retired

I am one of four daughters and two sons to Gloria Kleinhans, yes six in total, born in March of 1969. Number three in the lineup and split the middle with my younger sister Renae. We grew up primarily in a small farm town in the middle of the mitten, Ithaca, Michigan. Two blocks made up our downtown and we had the flashing lights for stop signs. Not a big enough town for them to actually change color. So needless to say, and to no surprise to many, I was considered a "hell-raiser" in my small town. All through school, 6th – 12th, I was in the band; back in my day, the band was something huge in our small town. And I ran track, very poorly, but I ran. Played volleyball, and oddly enough spent a year as a cheerleader and another as a Pom-Pom Girl.

Being our mom raised us on her own and I was far from an academic student, I was short on options for getting out of Ithaca.

My older brother, Kip, joined the Navy after he graduated in 1985 and I immediately started looking to the military for my future. Although my mom had always wanted one of us girls to be an Airline Stewardess to "see the world," she was thrilled I found something that would provide a secure future for me and possibly keep me out of trouble. I signed the papers to serve in the US Navy1986, delayed entry program and left Ithaca shortly after graduation in 1987. Truth be told, the Navy was not my initial choice. I wanted to be a Marine. But, I had heard a girl was raped in the USMC and I immediately changed my direction and ran to the USN.....little did I know. During my in-processing with the Navy I requested to be a Navy Diver but was told my eyesight wasn't good enough....again, little did I know.

Boot camp – Orlando, FL. Torpedomen's A School – Orlando, FL. The first duty station was a TMSN at Subic Bay, Philippines. This is where I met my first EOD Technicians and learned so many things my small town was not fit to share. I was all of 19 when I hit the PI and wow, just wow on the things I saw, learned, and participated in. In a nutshell, everything my mom told me about people in the world was not exactly correct. I left the PI with great stories, a USMC husband, and a new baby boy, Cotey, in

1990. This is also where I picked up the nickname "Mo" and the last name Tackitt. Sadly, no, I am not related to the Tackitt Family Vineyard. But I am a dedicated Club Member doing my part to drink as much as I can to support!

Next - Keyport, WA at the torpedo testing and depot was my first encounter with US Navy Divers and where I was able to pursue a new career. Oddly enough the

long-distance marriage to a Marine didn't work out as well as I had planned, but exactly as my "Sea Daddy", Billy Spoor", said it would. Off I went to 2C Dive School as a single parent and after graduation in 1993 was stationed in Norfolk, VA on the submarine tender USS EMORY S. LAND (AS-39) as a ship's husbandry diver for submarines. As glorified as that sounds, it was 5-hour bottom times in water that was always dark, and occasionally had to break the ice just to get in. This is also the time I switched rates to a Boatswains Mate (BM), earned my Enlisted Surface Warfare Specialist (ESWS) pin, and about the time I may have started listening to my "Sea Daddy" and began my path toward EOD. If you ask Billy, he'll say I never listened to him – that could be true. There were a few reasons I wanted to go into the EOD career field. One was I looked at the civilian contract divers at the end of the pier and they were looking old, beaten, and rough; only to find they weren't much older than me. Ultimately I wanted something more, something that would provide a good life for not only myself but for my son. And I always said, "bigger and better"; that seemed to be EOD for me. Although EOD seemed like a "bigger" choice for me, I can never beat the bonds made as a Deep Sea Diver. As many of us try to claim, but mine is true, "I had the best locker EVER!"

Graduated from EOD School in 1998 and off I went to EODMU6, Det 4 (Mine Counter Measure) in Ingleside, TX. I ended up back at NAVSCOLEOD in 2001 as an instructor in Demo Division, Curriculum Development, and lastly Ground Division. Finished up my time there in 2005, with my Master Training Specialist and without getting in too much trouble, and headed out to EODMU8 in Sigonella, Sicily.

Finished my tour just before MU8 shifted to Rota, Spain in 2009.

During my accumulated Navy time as a TM, BM, 2C Diver, and EOD I bounced on so many ships I can't remember but a few and they might be decommissioned by now. Awards and pins littered my chest and made my uniform hang to the side a bit. All seemed so important then and now are just a nice rack.

As I was getting close to my 20-year mark and finishing up my bachelor's degree, just a few classes shy of Intelligence Counter Terrorism, my world, and my plan flipped completely upside down. My fiancé and father to my daughter, Drucilla, died in a car accident on his way to work for his deployment. I am now a single mom, again. This changed my retirement career path completely. I needed something that kept me home and was no longer available for the duties required by the Intel career field.

I retired in 2009 out of Sigonella and landed in St. Augustine, FL at Flagler College. I had difficulty getting locked into a new degree but finally settled with Sports Management. Graduated in 2013 and was quickly hired by the EOD Warrior Foundation as the Director of Memorial Care and Events in Niceville, FL. I bought a small home just down the road from the EOD Schoolhouse, close enough to hear the demo practice range and larger pound shot days. Still sounds like freedom.

Nine and a half years just flew by, and I recently decided it was time for something new. I have to say what an honor it was caring for the EOD Memorial and being on the team when the Remembrance Garden was installed. There were many great accomplishments and memories during my time with the EODWF team.

I am now my own company, MTAC, LLC, and am currently teaching UXO Tech I at the University of Tennessee for Relyant Global. Not too old to start something new and keep moving forward.

Lastly, I have to give many thanks to my family. Had it not been for my older sister, Stacy, and my mom, I would have never gone to Dive School. It is because of my younger sister Renae, who lived with me for a time, I was able to go to EOD School. Because my mom retired early and moved with me to Italy and care for my son and daughter, I was able to take overseas orders. Had I not had the support of my family, I would not be who I am today. There is no amount of "Thank you" that can express how appreciative I am of them all. We've all heard the expression "It takes a village. "Thank you, mom, for providing me with a village".

Mo's awards include Joint Service Commendation Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster, the Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal, the Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal with three Gold Stars, Joint Meritorious Unit Award, Navy Meritorious Unit Commendation Ribbon, Navy Good Conduct Medal 5th Award, National Defense Service Medal 2nd Award, Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, Kosovo Campaign Medal with Service Star, Humanitarian Service Medal, Navy Sea Service Deployment Ribbon, Navy and Marine Overseas Service Ribbon, NATO Kosovo Medal, Navy Pistol Qualification Medal, Navy Rifle Sharpshooter Medal, Master EOD Badge, Navy Diver 2nd Class Badge, and the Naval Parachutist Badge.

LITTLE FALLS, Minn. (Feb. 5, 2023) – A U.S. Navy Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) Technician, assigned to EOD Mobile Unit Two, prepares a simulated demolition shot to render a training explosive safe in Little Falls, Minnesota, Feb. 8 2023, during Snow Crab Exercise 23-1, an exercise designed to test and evaluate U.S. Navy Explosive Ordnance Disposal's (EOD) and Navy Diver's capabilities and equipment in a simulated Arctic environment and improve combat effectiveness. U.S. Navy forces must be able to operate in the Arctic due to "rapidly melting sea ice and increasingly navigable waters", according to the Department of the Navy's Strategic Blueprint for the Arctic.

Several Navy EOD units of action participated in Snow Crab Ex, including Explosive Ordnance Disposal Mobile Unit (EODMU) 12, which exercised tactical control over Navy EOD from EODMU 2, Navy Divers from Mobile Dive and Salvage Unit (MDSU) 2, as well as Sailors from EOD Expeditionary Support Unit (EODESU) 2 and Explosive Ordnance Disposal Group (EODGRU) 2.

"During Snow Crab Ex, we put our people and our gear to the test," said Cmdr. David Scherr, commander, EODMU 12. "The Arctic presents challenging conditions, and lessons learned from Snow Crab Ex will help these Navy EOD teams operate quickly and efficiently anywhere with cold weather."

All participating units completed Arctic mobility and survival training to ensure they could effectively operate in cold-weather conditions. Navy EOD cleared simulated unexploded ordnance, secured critical infrastructure, and effectively communicated between distributed operating units in a training environment. Navy Divers successfully completed ice dive training to ensure they can complete dive and salvage operations in Arctic waters.

Camp Ripley and the Minnesota National Guard provided ideal conditions and training areas to simulate an Arctic environment for ice and cold weather dive training, where Navy divers can train in a subzero temperature and arduous conditions at training ranges.

EODMU 2, EODMU 12, EODESU 2, and MDSU 2 are headquartered at Joint Expeditionary Base Little Creek-Fort Story under EODGRU 2. EODGRU 2 operates as part of Navy Expeditionary Combat Command and EODGRU 2 provides skilled, capable, and combat-ready deployable Navy EOD and Navy Diver forces around the globe to support a range of operations.


